Hi Trudy:

Now that I am working on the series of letters I am really trying to nail down the timeline of Dr. Briggs' life and when he left CA for the second time. He was still in Marysville in January 1865 when he applied to become a lifetime member of the Marysville Masons and was leaving NY for Germany in April 1865. So I found him, arriving at the Port of NY on February 11, 1865 from Greytown, Nicaragua on the steamer Golden Rule, no departure date noted, appears to be traveling by himself, 38, born NY. Greytown was another departure point instead of crossing the Isthmus of Panama.

I also found the passenger list for the Ocean Queen, arriving at the Port of NY on May 30, 1863 with Maria Haskell who had left San Francisco with three children on April 23, 1863 bound for Aspinall, Panama.

The passenger lists indicates a 'Susan' Haskell, age 9. This was probably Irene as she was too old to be one of Maria's children, I believe. Her first child, Burnett was born around 1857/58.

Hi Trudy:

I am working on an article for the historical society newsletter and my deadline is Thursday! Anyway, did Irene have six, seven or eight children? I believe it was eight. Would appreciate a confirmation.

What we decided to do is have a series of called - In Their Own Words. Each article would cover a single topic, the first one being the trip from NY across the Isthmus of Panama. Include pictures, etc. The next topic would be Abby's death and Benjamin going to the mines. It seemed more manageable to do it this way. I will add details, images and maybe edit the letters a little for spacing.

What is exciting, with my Newspapers.com subscription and other newspaper sites, I located their passenger lists, it took a whole day, my eyes are tired.

They left NY on October 11 on the steamer Northern Light. There is a clipper Northern Light but they went on the steamer. In a letter to her sister, they shipped their goods around Cape Horn on the clipper ship Orpheus which would take several months.

After landing in Aspenwall (now Colon), they took the Panama railroad (48 miles) across the Isthmus and then boarded the steamer Uncle Sam arriving in San Francisco on November 6, 1861.

Unfortunately, I cannot find any images for the two steamers.

I also found a passenger from the Marysville Daily Appeal dated April 24, 1863:

"To The East.---The following is the passenger list of the P.M.S.S. Co.s steamship Sonora, which sailed from San Francisco for Panama at 9 o'clock yesterday morning:

Mrs. L.H. Haskell, Mrs. Maria Haskell and 3 children, etc."

Maria only had two children so this is surely when she took Irene east.

Of course, I will send you copies of the newsletters as they get published.

# On The Glendale Scene

## MONTROSE

(A French Word  
Meaning Mountain Rose)



The tranquil community of Montrose is located in the beautiful Crescenta Valley which is nestled in the foothills between the Verdugo Mountains, San Rafael Hills and the majestic San Gabriel Mountains. Elevation of the Crescenta Valley ranges from 1,100 feet to 2,700 feet at the highest point above sea level. The Foothill Freeway Interstate 210 and the Glendale State Freeway 2, enable residents to reach points in the Southern California area within minutes. Portions of the Crescenta Valley lie within the jurisdiction of the City of Glendale, the City of La Canada Flintridge and the unincorporated area of Los Angeles County.

The area is rich in Spanish heritage. In reward for valiant services to the King of Spain as a soldier in the California military, Jose Maria Verdugo, who served many years in the Mission guard at San Gabriel, was given the first private land grant of California. The date of conveyance was October 20, 1784, and became known as the Rancho San Rafael. It encompassed 36,000 acres of grazing land and spread from the Arroyo Seco, which now parallels the Pasadena Freeway, westward to Mission San Fernando. It included the sites of many future cities such as Glendale, Eagle Rock, La Canada, Montrose, Verdugo City and many others.

Beginning with the 1870's and through the 1920's, activity by developers provided the foundation for the communities of the Crescenta Valley.

Large acreage acquired by Dr. Benjamin Briggs came into the possession of his only daughter, Mrs. Irene Briggs Ward, after his death and she sold to Walton of Holmes and Walton. The Lanterman Subdivision and Beach Addition were also included in the territory which is now Montrose.

In 1914, the Glendale and Montrose Railway was constructed, bringing rail service north from Glendale, as far as Pennsylvania Avenue. The car barn was built in Montrose where the Anawalt Lumber Company is now located.

The community of Montrose, which is a French word meaning Mountain Rose, is a microcosm of business and services, catering to the needs of the local population. Shopping is a delight along tree-lined Honolulu Avenue, which is the main business district of Montrose and Verdugo City. The magnificent natural landscape adds to the country atmosphere, where shoppers get to know the local merchants and receive personal help in finding that "special item." Neighbors can meet for lunch in one of several fine restaurants. In addition, strip businesses and small shopping centers are located throughout the Crescenta Valley. Residents quickly learn that it pays to do business in the Crescenta Valley.

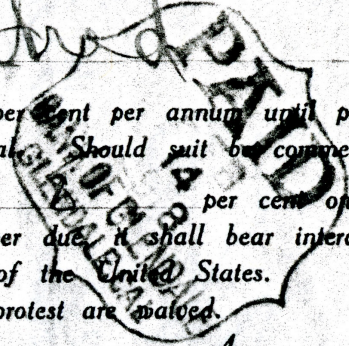

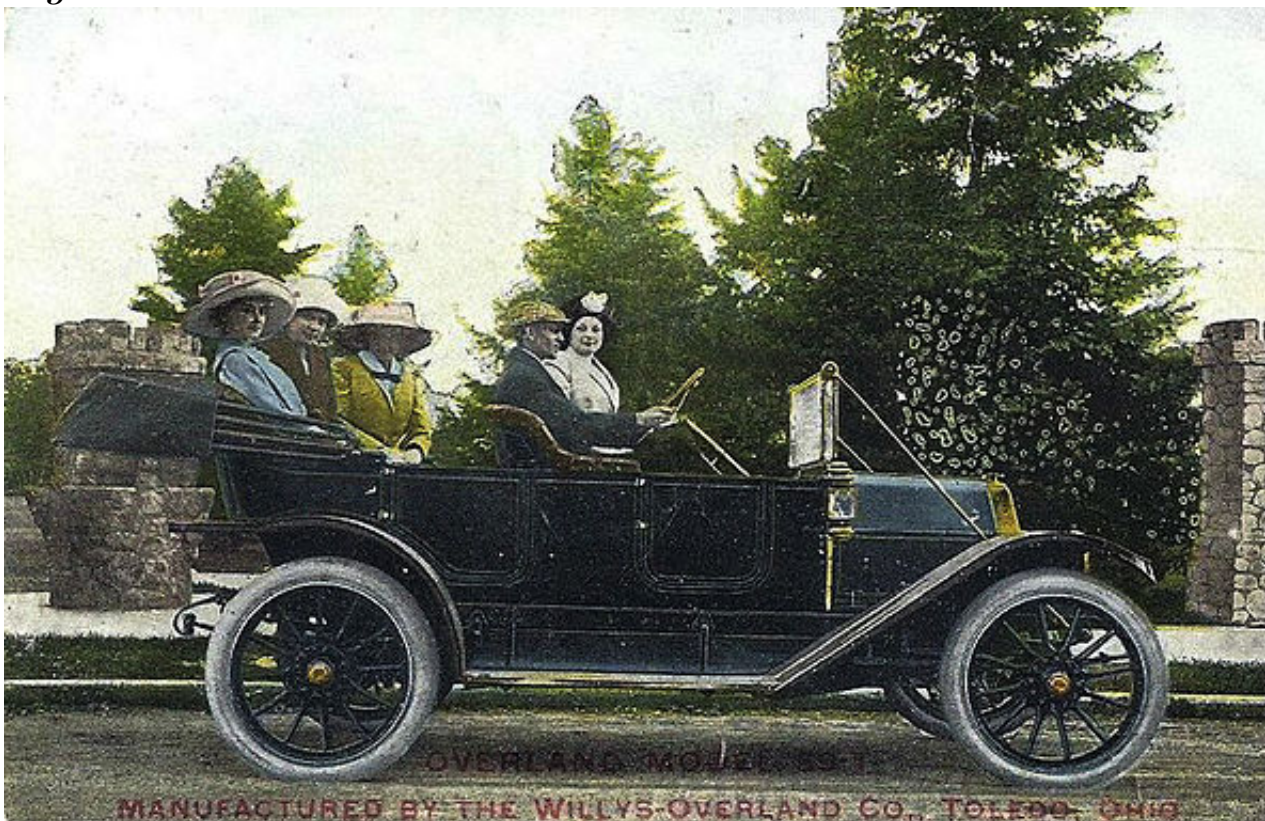

Well, I got through them! I did have some of them already. Some information I can use. The June 26, 1915 letter from Annie Ward talking about Irene selling 135 acres of La Crescenta land to Holmes-Watson finally confirms the sale. Nothing was published in the papers about it and I am done going down to the County Recorder's office to research records in the basement archives. Annie says Irene bought an Overland, this was marketed as a "Ladies Car" by the Overland Automobile Co. In 1915 it sold for around \$1295. which equates to \$37,974. in today's dollars. In 1917, in order to compete with Ford's Model T, they put out a cheaper model that cost \$550.

On a different subject, working on the prequel, it is strange but I cannot find much on Benjamin's & Abbie's courtship or wedding. She was from Berkley where Thomas Briggs came from but it was her sister Caroline who let their father, Levi Crane, know that Abbie had gotten married. In one of Levi's letters, he does not sound happy about the circumstances and said he would have liked to have attended the wedding. Irene was born 8 1/2 months later. Do you have anything to add?

## PREFACE

The publication of this volume of **THE COMPENDIUM OF AMERICAN GENEALOGY** marks the fifth milestone toward the completion of the *Genealogical History of the American Nation* in this *Standard Genealogical Encyclopedia of The First Families of America*.

A work of such large proportions will require many volumes of the size of this one, and will probably cover the span of two generations, but the progress achieved within the comparatively short period since the World War, out of which this work originated as a war measure, already gives it the distinction of having compiled and published a larger number of lineages than all the other general genealogical compilations combined during the first three hundred years of American history.

With more than 8,000 lineages in this volume added to the number published in Volumes I, II, III and IV, a total of more than 37,000 lineages, and with the combined indexes listing upward of 300,000 names of ancestors, it is unquestionably the first reference and research source in American genealogy.

The ideal of national service upon which this work was founded in 1917 by the editors of *Who's Who in America* is in a fair way to be realized provided the continuation of the work be not dependent upon the uncertainties of the span of life of any one individual or group of individuals. Therefore, perpetuation of the work has been effected, as certainly as it can be, by the provision to publish this and succeeding volumes under the auspices, and as the official publication, of **The Institute of American Genealogy**—now the largest genealogical organization in point of membership in this country.

For the benefit of those not familiar with the history of this work it may be stated that it had its inception in 1917 as a war measure. Participation in the World War by the United States made necessary a source of information for furnishing the lineages, with their inter-marriages, of large numbers of men and women who were engaged, or desired to participate, in the various war activities. The necessity for such information demonstrated the real need for an authoritative genealogical work of national character, one which could be accepted as the standard for the nation. Thus, this work was born of necessity to meet a crisis, and the names, files and voluminous data compiled during the war are the foundation upon which it is based.



## PREFACE

The facilities of one of the largest genealogical libraries in the country, supplemented by the most extensive lineage files and indexes extant, are utilized, and the most painstaking care on the part of a highly trained staff is exercised in checking for accuracy every lineage submitted for publication in this work.

The 37,000 lineages published to date have been gathered from about as many different sources, thousands of which are original manuscripts or private family archives, the result of private investigation. Most of these appear in print in this work for the first time and therefore cannot be verified by any other source. The address of the subject of each lineage record is included in order to afford contact for further research.

The Compendium has the distinction of being the only work on genealogy to be accepted for inclusion in the American Library Association's list of the first 10,000 books which every public library should have.

Volume I, published in December, 1924, contains over 5,000 records and upward of 10,000 lineages, comprising 1,148 pages.

Volume II, published in December, 1926, contains over 1,600 records and upward of 5,000 lineages, comprising 628 pages.

Volume III, published in December, 1928, contains over 2,000 records and upward of 6,000 lineages, comprising 810 pages.

Volume IV, published in December, 1930, contains over 2,000 records and upward of 8,000 lineages, comprising 912 pages.

Volume V, published in August, 1933, contains over 2,000 records and upward of 8,000 lineages comprising 943 pages.

Additional volumes, each complete and independent in itself, will be issued annually. Suggestions of names, and data pertaining to them, will be thankfully received and accorded every consideration for inclusion in this work. However, the editors reserve the right to accept for publication or reject any data submitted to them at their discretion. The records in this work are included with only one view, to increase the usefulness of the work; no space has been paid for, nor can it be.
